## O. D. B. A. 1938 - 1939

During the 1938-39 season, Chrysler offered us a beautiful new Plymouth Road King four door sedan for the bargain price of \$884.00. Canada, The United States and Great Britain signed a reciprocal trade agreement and Pope Pius the X1 died. At the start of the season Britain and Germany were signing a peace accord; by the end, Germany had expanded her borders again and again. In Spain the tide was turning to the side of Franco.

#### THE DISTRICT

The District was probably at its peak during this season. The tournament format was well co-ordinated to the best advantage of the players. Prior to Christmas the only tournament play consisted of friendly challenge matches. In January we saw both BCO and RBC hold their "A" tournaments the same week followed by the District "A". February saw the same format followed for the "B" level players, while the "A"s were away at the OBA championships, followed by the nationals. The results of the provincial and national championships might indicate that we were a might too organized. The District was also able to resurrect the junior championships which had been cancelled last year.

League action was furious with eight teams in the District League, including three teams who also held membership in the Church League, which itself had ten teams. The competitive level of players throughout the District can best be seen by the fact that, for the second year in a row, two of the so called recreational club teams made it to the semi finals of the District League play. This time Rideau BC Gold team winning over a combined Church League team.

The Journal Trophy was again contested with the Rideau BC re capturing the Cup from BCO with a 9 to 6 match victory.

#### THE PROVINCIAL SCENE:

The provincial championships and AGM moved to the Kitchener Granite Club. The meet saw the affiliation of the Nickel Belt District which was the fore runner of the Northern Ontario Badminton Association. Approval was given for an assistance grant to Mrs. W.R. Walton to aid her in attending the All England Championship. The District was represented by E.C. Forrest and W.F. Loathian.

#### THE NATIONAL SCENE:

The National Championships were not very kind to the Ottawa District after such a stellar record over the previous decade. In the Championship matches, Ruth and Marg Robertson went down in the third round of Ladies Doubles. It was their first match. They were defeated by Barb Jarmen and Doreen Clapperton, a Toronto team recently transplanted from Calgary, by a score of 14-18, 17-15, 15-8. The Robertsons suffered further degradation when they lost the deciding match, which allowed Quebec to win the Manitoba Cup, an interprovincial doubles competition held in conjunction with the nationals. The only good news was the re election of Mr. W.N. Keenan as CBA president for 1939-40.

An interesting note from the national scene was a debate in Edmonton, where Alderman D.K. Knot argued against a request for tax utility concession for the badminton club. His points were that badminton would soon die a natural death because it is far too expensive to play (as much as \$1 per night) and that it was far too strenuous, with people dying on court. The councillor was rebuked by CBA Ladies Singles Champion, the "comely" Mrs. W.R. Walton who retorted that there were no more people dying on court than in any other sport and that to spend \$1 per night you would have to be playing all night in a championship series. A more realistic figure would be in the range of 35 cents per night. The end result went unreported.

The long awaited competition, between professional and amateur, would take to the courts of the Carlton Club in Toronto during the last week of March. The semi finals and finals were conducted on the stage of the prestigious Massey Hall on April 2nd but the results were not what the odds makers had anticipated. Number one seed, World Professional Champion Jack Purcell, went down to defeat in the quarter finals to Bill Markham, a relatively new American from New York losing 10- 15, 15- 7, 18- 14. Second seed Doug Grant, a Canadian

professional playing out of Detroit, was defeated by pro Noel Radford, another transplant and Markham's coach, by scores of 17-16, 7-15, 15-7. George Goodwin Jr., the former Ottawa amateur, who challenged and lost to Purcell last year, defeated Radford in the semi's and went on to face Markham in the main event. In the best of three competition, Goodwin took the crown by scores of 17-16, 12-15, 15-11. In the Men's Doubles competition Purcell and Jack Sibbald of Toronto were defeated 17-7, 15-6 by the amateur pair of Jim and Paul Snyder from Waterloo. Men's Singles and Doubles were the only two events contested.

It would be many decades before amateurs and professionals would again take to the courts, in sanctioned matches. George Goodwin Jr. could possibly to be the only amateur able to claim the title of world champion. Until the onset of the I.B.F. World Championships, the All England Open was generally acknowledge as the unofficial event for world supremacy..

The professional players mentioned above were for the most part made up of a dozen or so, mostly Canadians, playing out of clubs in both Canada and the US who toured North American playing exhibitions to packed houses, often in large stage venues such as Massey Hall and Radio City Music Hall in New York where the stage and audience seating complimented the show. The week before the above competition, Purcell had confirmed his World Title with a victory over Radford in Los Angeles.
